

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PASTOR DEBBIE'S LETTER FOR THE CARILLON



Dear Ones,

After 16 months as your interim pastor and writing these letters to you, this is my last. It is both with heavy heart and joyful anticipation as I ponder my next journey after leaving this beloved church and all of you. I will always be a "cheerleader" for the ministry teams of SCC; ministries that have become so dear to me and which I hope to continue lifting in my work as a board member for WAIM beginning this month.

I am looking forward, as you know, to spending more quality time with my two grand-daughters, Ava and Nyah, both in New Hampshire and during the summer at my lake. On the spur of the moment, I will be able to hop in the car and drive to NH if my help is needed or to attend a school event; something I have not been able to do these last three years.

It appears like Brit's Home in Haiti needs me more now than ever with continuing upheaval in the country, with many of our teens transitioning to independent living while continuing their studies at Brit's Academy, and with teacher development training and programming at the school. If it is safe, I hope to be in Haiti in person mid-June. I do have an office at our BLB Operations Center in Worcester and I hope you will be able to come and visit our offices there and have lunch whenever you might be free.

My travel plans include a trip to Paris to visit my son, Josh, time in Florida with my brother and sister-in-law, a July retreat on Enders Island in Mystic, and a dream trip to the island of Iona in Scotland in mid-August. The Iona retreat is sponsored by Hartford Seminary and there are 27 of us going in the group. Best of all, the Rev. Dr. John Philip Newell – theologian, spiritual teacher, and author - will be our retreat guide on Iona for a week before heading back to Glasgow. And then...some time in Italy where I have rented an apartment across from the sea in my favorite location.

I look forward to spending this last month with you as we journey together toward Easter. We have several wonderful services and events planned and I will cherish my time left with you. I will be in communication with you regarding transition plans for a bridge minister before your settled pastor arrives, as will the Governing Board.

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I leave you with this prayer from Celtic saint, St. Columba, and in the hope that you will, individually and collectively, follow the star to your next journey and to heed God's call for you.

The Prayer of St. Columba

Be a bright flame before me, O God a guiding star above me.
Be a smooth path below me, a kindly shepherd behind me today, tonight, and forever.
Alone with none but you, my God I journey on my way; what need I fear when you are near, O Lord of night and day?
More secure am I within your hand than if a multitude did round me stand.

UPDATE FROM THE SANCTUARY CURTAIN TASK GROUP

Church Family,

The Governing Board asked Jane Ann Bobbitt, Marsha Creese & Eileen Metzgar to form a task group to look into different options for window coverings in our Meeting House. We want to share the work that we have done so far. We found out that the current coverings have been up almost 25 years. They were made & installed by Kellner's Window Gallery of Vernon. It was time to take them down. They certainly owed us nothing!

Three of us have worked together over the last two months meeting to set goals, as put forth to us and to prioritize them. The main goal being to explore different possibilities for window coverings, that would be aesthetically pleasing and offer some insulation. We want to THANK Duffy Brookes for the



very difficult job of measuring every one of the varied windows and giving us a detailed schematic to use. This was very helpful!

We chose two companies to contact. Next we set meetings with Budget Blinds of Glastonbury/Manchester and Kellner's Window Gallery of Vernon. They showed us samples and talked about the pros & cons of at least five different options. There are so many things to consider!

At this time we are getting estimates for products that we believe will accomplish the goals. If you have anything you would like to share with us, please feel free to contact any one of us.

SCC FAITH FORMATION

What does it mean to be a *Contemplative in Action?*

The movement Contemplatives in Action at Marquette University, answers this question as: "a Contemplative in Action spends time in self-reflection and discernment to look within and make sense of their experiences. Leaders then take action for the greater good, informed by this reflection and the movements of the soul."

What does it mean to spend time in 'self-reflection and discernment to look within before taking action for the greater good'? Engaging in some type of contemplative spiritual practice helps us to open to our interior selves at a deeper level. Meditation, quiet reflection, Centering Prayer, Lectio/Visio/Audio Divina, mindfulness practice, walking a Labyrinth, spending time in nature, journaling, creative arts expression, breath-work and yoga/Tai Chi/Qigong are various forms of contemplative practices.

What does being a *Contemplative in Action* have to do with Christianity? As faithful disciples of Christ, each of us are on a spiritual path to become more Christ-like, as we grow and transform on our journey and we mature in our faith. My former senior pastor, Rev. Dr. Jody Seymour, now retired as a United Methodist Minister, often told our congregation that as Christians we were "little Christs" and that we always have an open invitation to engage in a deeper relationship with Our Creator. Pastor Jody also often reminded us that "the longest journey in the world was from head to the heart." When he said this from the pulpit, he would encourage us to engage in some form of contemplative practice to experience journeying to the heart. When we move into the depths of the heart, in silence, with Christ, we await to hear that "still small voice" speak wisdom toward taking action.

Father Thomas Keating, a Cistercian Monk, known as one of the principal developers of the contemporary form, Centering Prayer, while at nearby St. Joseph's Abbey in Spencer, Massachusetts writes of the importance of contemplation in our current times. In his book, Heartfulness: Transformation in Christ, he writes: "The contemplative journey is the most responsible of all responses to God because so much depends on it--the future of humanity, the healing of the wounds of humanity, our own deepest healing. It's not just a method of meditation or a practice to find personal peace. It's basically a total acceptance of the human condition."

How does this fit in with the United Church of Christ? "Becoming a Church of Contemplatives in Action is a resolution of the 33rd General Synod in July 2021, calling for the United Church of Christ to be a church of "contemplatives in action". The United Church of Christ is known historically as a denomination for its bold leadership on social justice, peace, and environmental concerns. This resolution seeks the church's integration of action for justice alongside

intentional commitment to the life of prayer. Through fostering spiritual practices that deepen us in love for God, neighbors, ourselves, and all creation, this Resolution would empower the UCC to more fully root its collective life of activism for justice in the prayerful life of contemplation. By declaring its support for this resolution, the General Synod will emphasize the necessity of experiential grounding in the love of God alongside our common witness for justice and peace, while resourcing the wider church in the diversity of spiritual disciplines." (from the Business Committee of the Thirty-Third General Synod)

At Storrs Congregational, we invite everyone to discover contemplative spiritual practices to deepen our love for God, neighbors, ourselves, and all creation to empower our actions for peace and justice! Please join us for Quiet Reflection in Waggoner Chapel on Wednesdays at 10am, take a Labyrinth Walk on Communion Sundays in the Auditorium and our Contemplation in Action Good Friday Walk in Willimantic, April 15 at 1pm (meet at 12:30 at the church to carpool.), contact me to meet to explore spiritual practices you might like to try, and send photos, poetry, short stories or other creative expressions of your contemplation AND action to add to our bulletin board. lisa@storrscongchurch.org

An update from Brooklyn Correctional Institute shares that Tutors/Workers within the Correctional facility are inventorying and cataloging the books collected thru SCC. Once the books are cataloged, the list will be uploaded to every inmates' tablet and each inmate will be able to request selections from the list as their interest leads them. Requests will be filled within 1-2 days.

Currently, deputies are seeking 6 large bookcases to organize the books by genre. The inmates are excited about the plan.

Brooklyn's principal, Chris Hemple, stated: "In short order we will be the envy of all libraries in the Department of Corrections in large part because these books will be readily available and carefully tracked. We could not have accomplished this without your collective efforts."

OUTREACH REPORT

On behalf of all the readers residing at Brooklyn Correctional Facility, thank you to Malta Bailey and Nancy Rucker for your leadership and follow-through on the **Books for Brooklyn** project. Thirty- five boxes of books were collected. This initiative was certainly well-received by the congregation.

The Co-coordinators of Outreach Ministries wish to point out that this was a perfect example of the way Ministry teams should work under our new governance: we agreed on a need, found a way to meet it, had leaders take responsibility, found volunteers and involved the congregation to provide the solution, and saw the mission to its conclusion.

A REFLECTION BY ELLEN BRADLEY

Glacial rock. The mere mention of it sounds cold and ancient. How about the White Mountains in New Hampshire once being buried under 2 MILES of it? That's a layer of ice and rock and hardened lava even deeper than the same distance the church is to Route 44. The White Mountains were actually buried that much at one time. As it all melted and shifted and banged around throughout millions of years, lots of beauty was created - landmarks that we now, in the modern age enjoy as tourist attractions, safe and benign places with man-made fences and walkways, places to enjoy and create memories with friends and family.

It isn't always that warm and cozy though, even now that things have settled down. We are just in one fragment of time, and changes are still being made, so slowly that many lifetimes go by before they are noticed. One of our favorite places to visit in the White Mountains is the Flume Gorge, and although it certainly is a spectacular hike with vertical walls of granite, cascading waterfalls, the river bounding and rushing mightily over the boulders strewn about in the deep gorge, there is ample evidence of the perseverance of nature in an environment still partially stuck in the age of creation.

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Because the entire area is made up of glacial rock, I am always amazed to see trees – huge trees – seemingly growing out of the large rocks and boulders. How could they possibly be supported? Upon closer inspection, the roots of these trees snaked round and round the boulders until reaching an area of life-sustaining soil. There, a root dug in. Some roots were content to not even reach soil but just a small patch of moss before digging in. Some reached and stretched until they

merged with another root. Some roots looked like an octopus plopped upon a boulder with root tips clenched into the ground. It seems like all of these trees were entirely undaunted by the inconvenience of not having the necessity nutrients close at hand, they simply surround the boulders in an arboreal bear hug, reaching and stretching and tapping into whatever life source they could eventually find, then anchoring in and thriving.

Humans can try this too. In times of struggling with loneliness, sadness, adversity, or unmet needs, we can also stretch way out until we reach something that gives us what we need. We may find that we reach another person, a new job or hobby, or an opportunity that will let us embrace and receive sustenance. It is comforting to know that we don't have to be trapped in the desolate glacial rocks of despair if we use the example of the tree, and similar beauty to feed our souls and to share with others, might even be created!

BACK BY POPULAR CONSENSUS

Based on congregational feedback, what was thought to be a "good idea" ...to have the phone system provide the answering message and extensions before ringing at the office desk... turned out to be unpopular and it did not provide any benefits to callers or staff.

Well...you spoke and we listened! Effective March 22nd the phone system has been restored to the "way it was" and you will once again be greeted personally by Deborah in the main office when you call the church. Thank you to those of you who provided feedback, you have helped bring about change! Thank you to those who did not provide feedback, you are a testament to patience and flexibility.

CWS HYGIENE AND SCHOOL KITS

On Monday, March 14th Laurie Brookes reported, "We are bringing 17 boxes to Meriden with 64 School Kits and 63 Health Kits! Yay!

A total of 127 kits will cost our budget \$254 (for mailing costs).

I think we should be very pleased; as prior to Covid (~2019) I saw that we gave a total of 120 Kits (69 School kits and 51 Health kits).

School Kits are necessary at all times, especially in the aftermath of natural disasters when communities are struggling to restore normalcy, these kits bring a sense of order.

Hygiene Kits provide the necessary items that make all the difference between sickness and health for families in need or displacement due to war or natural disaster.

JUST MERCY by Bryan Stevenson



His memoir, JUST MERCY, tells of his life's work and the deep stain of racial injustice in America and focuses on his work with the Initiative in defending the poor, and the wrongly condemned. Stevenson sheds light on abhorrent cases of injustice and the treatment of

people in our justice system. One such case is that of Walter McMillian, a man on death row for killing a woman.

According to author Rebecca Main, "Just Mercy is at once an unforgettable account of an idealistic gifted young lawyer coming of age, a moving window into the lives of those he has defended and an inspiring argument for compassion in the pursuit true justice."
