You cannot visit His remains; you can only visit His empty grave because He isn't there. He Arose!

On Easter there are no tears of sorrow. no pain of separation. He is alive and at work in our lives drawing us into living in relationship with God and our neighbors on earth as it is in heaven. Whether you will be worshipping with us in-house or online, or out of town with family, take time to give thanks that "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that


Panel Presents the Map of Racism in Real Estate in Milwaukee County

On April 30, 1968, two weeks after Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was assassinated, the Milwaukee Common Council passed the Fair Housing Law. Introduced and led by Alderwoman Vel Phillips, this ordinance gave all people the right to live where they wanted. Yet, racially discriminatory covenants still persist on homeowners' deeds.

To honor the anniversary of the Fair Housing Law in Milwaukee, an expert panel will present the contours of racism in real estate being mapped in Milwaukee County on **April 27 at 7 p.m.** at Christ Church Episcopal, 5655 N. Lake Dr., Whitefish Bay. Titled "Mapping Racism and Resistance in Milwaukee County: Struggles over Racism and Real Estate in the Urban North," the event will also be livestreamed on YouTube and recorded for later viewing.

Are you a curious person, constantly trying to learn more about this world and the culture we live in?
Then join some of your fellow church members in visiting America's
Black Holocaust Museum at 2 p.m. on Friday, April 29.
The Museum is located at

401 W. North Ave. in Milwaukee. It features seven history galleries which

tell the story of the Black Holocaust in chronological order from life in Africa before captivity to African American life today. Three of the world's most influential empires were Ghana, Mali, and Songhai in Africa, contributing to world culture in astronomy, mathematics, medicine, metallurgy, and shipbuilding.

The Museum was founded in 1988 by Dr. James Cameron, the only known survivor of a lynching. It was forced to close in 2008 during the Country's economic downturn but reopened online in 2012. Then on February 25, 2022, the physical galleries were reopened with the goal being to build public awareness of the harmful legacies of slavery and Jim Crow laws in America and to promote racial repair, reconciliation and healing. Black Holocaust refers to the

period from the 1400s to the 1800s when 12.5 million Africans were taken in the trans-Atlantic slave trade.




WANTED: Wedding photos from ceremonies at our church



Mission of the Month for April — Meta House

Loose change and other offerings toward the Mission of the Month for the month of April will benefit Meta House. As a local SE Wisconsin non-profit organization, Meta House seeks to end the generational cycle of addiction by healing women and strengthening families. Meta House was one of the first residential treatment facilities in the country designed specifically for women with substance use disorders, and has been providing gender-specific, family-centered treatment for almost 60 years! It was also one of the first in the nation to include children in the residential setting.



While the cornerstone of the Meta House program is addiction treatment, Meta House also offers numerous wraparound services to its clients including case management, parenting classes, job-and-education-readiness programs, peer support and fatherhood engagement opportunities. This holistic approach is both strength-based and trauma-informed, helping give every woman her very best chance to heal, find life-long recovery, lead a healthy family and become a productive, independent member of the community.

Meta House thanks UMCWFB for being included in last December's Christmas with a Conscience and is proud to count several members of the UMCWFB congregation as volunteers and supporters, including church member CJ Neville, who currently chairs the Meta House Board of Directors. Capuchin Walk For The Hungry (St. Ben's Meal Program)

On **Sunday, June 13 at noon**, our church is sponsoring a group walk to help fund the Capuchin hunger ministry. We have served a meal monthly at the St. Ben's meal site for many years, but this past year, because of the virus, we haven't been able to volunteer. This is our way to show our support for the great food ministry they continue to perform for the hungry in their neighborhood. During normal years, the Capuchins sponsor a walk along the lake during Polish Fest. This year, they are asking organizations to sponsor their own walks locally. We plan on doing a 1 ½ to 2 mile walk starting at church. Everyone who registers will receive a T-shirt in the mail. They ask that you register online as soon as possible in order to receive your shirt before the walk.

Notes from the Board

Spring is in the air, and with it, the hope of spiritual renewal and a re-engagement of our church community. There are many ways to re-engage - the Vigil for Peace on April 2, the Requiem at both services on April 3, Palm Sunday on April 10, Holy Week and Easter on April 17, and the Children's Musical on April 24. Come and feed your soul this month.

Charge Conference

This year's Charge Conference will be held on Monday, May 9, at 7 p.m. Charge Conference is an annual all-church meeting where the business of the church is conducted. Our outgoing District Superintendent, Rev. Forrest Wells, will preside.

Staff Parish Relations

The position of Director of Media Outreach was clarified to distinguish it from Anne Eversfield's role as Manager of Communications. Anne focuses primarily on internal communication while this new role would expand external media posts, public relations and outreach. Both Anne and the Director of Media Outreach would work together and with help from other staff to implement an overall internal/external communications strategy for the church. We are still working to fill this role and the position of Director of Membership and Engagement.

Weddings and Funerals

The church has provided families with a brochure for weddings and funerals for many years. Lynn Bennett currently serves as our weddings and funerals coordinator. However the weddings procedure fell into disuse during COVID. The wedding brochure is now being updated and another coordinator is being recruited to help families with logistics in planning a wedding at the church.

Trustees

We reviewed the renovations being considered for the Narthex.

The key renovations would include:

A coffee shop at the current site of Lydia's Treasure.

A fireplace and sitting area at the site of the current coffee area.

A new location for Lydia's Treasure created by repurposing the far (south) end of the main office.

An enclosed coat room around the coat rack on the south end of the Narthex.

A new church legacy area in the NE hallway off the Narthex.

New carpeting and flooring, where needed.

Art for the blank white walls and improved lighting.

The cost of the renovations would be \$200,000. The funds would come from the Capital Fund and funds raised in a capital campaign.

Notes

Finances

FY 2021-2022 Budget - we had a weak February with \$41,022 in pledge and \$3,218 in non-pledge income. This led to a \$22,479 deficit for the month which reduced our surplus for the year to \$34,205. This is similar to the \$38,599 surplus at this time last year. We project that the budget will balance at the end of the fiscal year which is June 30. Although revenues will be below budget, expenses will also be below budget due to open staff positions and lower than expected Trustee expenses.

Capital Account, Future Fund and Properties Capital Fund - our Capital Account and Future Fund remained the same at \$68,501 and \$97,435, respectively, and the Properties Capital Fund remained at \$213,507.

Paycheck Protection Program Grant

The church has received a second Paycheck Protection Program grant of \$196,000. The ALB is still discussing how it should be used but there is a strong desire to provide more consistent raises for staff. Our longest tenured staff have received only 3 or 4 small raises in the last 15 years. The last Paycheck Protection Program grant was used primarily to provide bonuses to staff.

Proposed FY 2022-23 Budget

The board reviewed the first draft of the FY 2022-23 budget. Although actual pledges are projected to remain the same as the FY 2021-budget, revenue from non-pledge income, Christmas offering, and NSSS are projected to be lower. Expenses are not expected to increase.

Pledge Drive

The pledge drive for the FY 2022-23 budget will run from May 22 to June 5.

BSA Troop 400 Update

The completion of an agreement governing our church's relationship with Troop 400 continues to be delayed as attorneys for the National Boy Scouts Association and the Conference work to resolve BSA's concerns with the liability provisions in the Conference's Facility Use Agreement.

Technology

There has been some confusion about Steve Brooks' role. He helps maintain the computer network and the staff laptops. He does not work with the Shelby - the church administration platform, or the website.

The next meeting of the ALB will be on Tuesday, April 19, at 6:30 p.m.
