PASTOR'S POST

Dear Church Family,

Have you ever tried to describe a place you have been to someone who has never been there? It is much harder than it sounds. Imagine with me that someone who lives above the Arctic Circle, maybe in Alaska, goes down to Southern California. Then upon their return, they want to tell the people there what it is like. The easiest way to do that is describe how it is not like what they know. They would say there is no ice or snow, the ground never freezes. It is warm all the time. There are no Elk or Moose.



This is what we get in this passage below from the book of Revelation. John has a vision of heaven, and it is so different, so other worldly, he has no choice but to describe it in the ways it is not like the life we know. He says there are no tears, no death. Our next **Loom Service** will be Tuesday, November 9th at 7 p.m., in person, in the Gathering Room in the Parish House. We encourage you

to make plans to come and invite your friends and neighbors to this new alternative service.

Our **Loss and Grief Group** led by Pastor Malcolm holds their meetings on the second Wednesday of each month. November's meeting will be November 10th., 9:30 - 10:30, in the Gathering Room. Invite people you think would benefit from a space to talk about changes and losses we have had in our lives. Any change, good or bad, is a loss, and this group is more than just for the loss of loved ones, but for any and all losses we have experienced. There will be coffee and treats provided. Any questions feel free to contact Pastor Malcolm.

OPEN AND AFFIRMING

We held a second informational session at Fellowship Hour on October 3. The presentation covered:

- A review of what "ONA" really is: a public covenant of welcome to a wide and very diverse range of spiritual seekers, especially those who identify as LGBTQIA.
- The process is important, for when it presents us with struggles, we as a church have opportunities to talk with one another deeply, and that strengthens us.
- The words "open and affirming" are important because many churches use "All are welcome" -- when in fact seekers of different, non-mainstream walks of life have often found through painful experience that that's not entirely true.
- Out of 4,852 UCC churches in the US, 33% have adopted an ONA Covenant.
- These nearby towns have UCC churches that have adopted an ONA Covenant: Cheshire, Bethel, Bethlehem, Brookfield, Danbury

- (2), Fairfield, Monroe, New Fairfield, Newtown, Ridgefield, Shelton, Washington, Waterbury, Westport.
- There are no minimum requirements or actions prescribed by the UCC for SBCC to show externally that we are Open and Affirming. The ONA team has no plan to fly a rainbow flag or add anything to our wooden sign. Judy Grimes explained the meaning of each colored stripe in the original 1970s rainbow flag.
- The current draft of the SBCC covenant was presented:

We celebrate the uniqueness of each of God's children.

We extend the extravagant welcome of God to all people regardless of their race/ancestry/ethnicity, gender identity, gender expression, physical or mental capacity, marital status, immigration status, faith, sexual orientation, political affiliation, age, culture, or economic reality.

We pray we each freely experience God's loving presence among us. No matter where you are on life's journey, you are welcome here.

- Next steps include: holding additional info/education sessions during fellowship hour, follow-up survey, revising the covenant based on feedback, presenting final covenant to Council, calling a church meeting for all members to vote on becoming ONA, gathering as a church body to affirm the words of the covenant, and finally, creating imagery and words to communicate our ONA status on social media so people will know SBCC is a safe loving space for them and their families. Questions that arose during the Q&A session:
- Q: Do other denominations have a similar designation?
- A: Yes, most mainstream denominations have a similar concept.
- Q: Can you clarify "faith" in the covenant's list of attributes?

A: Faith means any person of any faith (or no faith) is welcome -- Catholics, Jews, atheists.

The ONA team stands ready to answer any questions or discuss any concerns you may have as we move forward in this work -- as does Pastor Malcolm. Please reach out if you need us. Thank you!
