CLEAN COMMUNITIES PROGRAM UPDATE

Community volunteers track their time while collecting trash and recyclables from our streets and public places. They are "paid" by designating 501(c)3 nonprofits and clubs (shown at right) to receive donations for each hour of work.

FoHVOS has administered the program for Hopewell Township for decades by organizing volunteers, cleaning areas, and providing necessary items including vests, gloves, bags and more.

All trails shown here wind through preserved forests and private lands with public access easements held by collaborating partners NJDEP-Green Acres, Mercer County, Hopewell Township, D&R Greenway Land Trust and Friends of Hopewell Valley Open Space. All trails were built (or are being built) by a team of committed community volunteers.

Additional trail spurs, beyond these 2022 plans, are being developed by D&R Greenway Land Trust and Friends of Hopewell Valley Open Space.

It has taken over 20 years to acquire all of the properties and easements necessary to complete this expansive trail network.

Highland Cemetery Association granted the final easement to FoHVOS, providing access to the 1.7mile one-way (or 3.4 miles roundtrip) Hopewell-Sourland Trail that includes scenic views of forest and waterfalls and skirts alongside sheep and farm fields.

2021 FoHVOS Accomplishments

FoHVOS has partnered with each of the six HVRSD public schools to install outdoor learning areas replete with native plantings. Our Community Conservation projects began in 2018 primarily to provide an outdoor respite and a place to teach students about ecology, biodiversity, ecosystem, and habitat information.

FoHVOS worked with the schools to create unique environments best suited for integration into their current landscape, while also taking ease of access to the space into account. Schools received Sustainable Jersey certification.

In 2022, we will finalize and install interpretive signage at all school locations to educate students, staff, and the greater community.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS 2021

3 elementary schools installed 3,500 native plants & wildflowers from Xerces grants

All 6 schools received Watershed "River Friendly" recognition

Long Term Impact

In addition to COVID-related health and wellness benefits, these projects have notable, and measurable positive environmental impacts, including:

- Increased native wildlife, pollinator, insect, and bird populations.
- 1.2 acres of meadows planted with native species store 2400 pounds carbon per year in soil.
- 35 trees planted remove 1750 pounds carbon per year.
- Timberlane Middle School rain garden and Central High School detention basin reduce runoff by collecting 168,511 gallons rainwater per storm

These native plantings are not only beautiful, but also are self-sustaining and help promote efficient drainage around the buildings.

ONGOING STEWARDSHIP SUCCESS STORIES

We expanded residential Community Conservation through additional native plantings and wildlife habitat protection that includes kestrel, pollinators, and other rare species.

FoHVOS staff are recognized as among the most experienced and skilled land stewards throughout the state. As such, we are sought after for federal, statewide, and regional land use planning, protection, and educational opportunities.

FoHVOS rare plant stewardship led to MILLIONS of new seeds!

In 2021, we provided training to conservation professionals across the state that included professional and community conferences, 15 webinars and field workshops, that educated over 500 people.

Over 120 people attended our conferences and received almost 300 Continuing Education Units (CEUs)

We led seasonal intern training for Sourland Conservancy and D&R Greenway to facilitate greater impact through partnered conservation.

OUTDOOR EQUITY ALLIANCE

Educational, recreational, and career opportunities for ALL people to enjoy nature and become stewards of the outdoors In 2019, FoHVOS and Mercer County Park Commission united various sectors across Mercer County toward a common purpose of creating inclusive and accessible public open spaces.

Today the OEA includes over 30 public, private and nonprofit organizations sharing knowledge and resources to remove barriers to access, participation, and engagement for underserved communities.

In 2021, FoHVOS signed a fiscal sponsorship agreement with the OEA and confirmed OEA board leadership.

In 2021, OEA advisors developed a strategic plan that led to securing \$50,000 in new funding from the PACF Bunbury Fund.

In 2020, FoHVOS introduced a paid internship program that partnered students from Hopewell Valley Central High School and the Mercer County Boys and Girls Club to address land stewardship and climate change issues in diverse teams. While we pivoted to Zoom and outdoor field trips, project work was cancelled due to COVID.

In 2021, the COVID-friendly paid internship program focussed on declining bird populations. Our successful high school avian internship allowed students to learn about nesting, diets, and migration, and use research and data gathering techniques including bird banding. Interns completed a final project and survey.

Our 2022 Agrihood internship engages local farmers to teach urban farming techniques, history, and sustainable gardening.
