Kosti Ruohomaa Collection: February 2022 Rollout By Matt Wheeler, Digital Collections Curator

As we near the middle of winter,
Monhegan Island in Maine is also coming
up on the middle of its lobstering season.
Ruohomaa visited the remote
plantation—destination for sightseers and
artists and home to adaptable
mavericks—one week in January, late in
his career, to capture the harsh setting
and the characters who inhabited it.
Ruohomaa, an independent spirit himself,
had just leveraged his talent and
reputation with Black Star to renegotiate
his contract, giving him latitude to devise
his own assignments. The Monhegan visit
was one of the first.

Back on the mainland, years earlier at the beginning of his tenure with Black Star, Ruohomaa made a trip back to his childhood (and future) home on Dodge Mountain in Rockland during the annual blueberry harvest. This bare coastal hillside with its panoramic exposure to Penobscot Bay had been a wellspring of inspiration to the creative young man, whose passion for art led him to break with his farming lineage and eventually to become a photojournalist. His images of the harvest celebrate the life which shaped him: a life intertwined with land and place.
